

Brass Ring Motif (optional extra for Bracelet # 2) - © Jane Eborall



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


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The small curtain ring motif can be attached to the [bracelet 2](#) either by sewing it on or with a removable earring attachment. Being removable makes the bracelet far more versatile. There are also [two earrings](#) designed to co-ordinate with this pattern. The finished motif is 3D and resembles a water lily. It could be used to make a matching necklace.

Materials required

1 shuttle. No. 20 thread. 40 small beads. 1" diameter brass curtain ring or similar. Flat back earring base with bullet back – see picture on right for easily attaching or removing motif from bracelet. Of course, it could be sewn on!!



Abbreviations

s-	small picot	R	ring	Ch	chain
BR	brass ring	B	bead	Btwn	between
- (or p)	picot	T & C	Tie and cut		

Centre ring

1 s- 1 T & C See fig. 1

Row 1 – see fig. 2

R: 1 - 1 + (BR) 1 - 1

*Ch: 1 + (p on centre R) 1

R: 1 + (3rd p of last R) 1 + (BR) 1 - 1


Repeat from * 6 times joining last R to first R

Ch: 1 + (p on centre R) 1 T & C. See fig. 2

Fig. 3 shows where the rows 2 & 3 join the centre and fig. 3a shows a join being worked.



Row 2 – inner upright row. (fig. 3)

NB make join go under BOTH sides of the p from left to right.

Thread 8 beads onto chain thread.

R: 1 - 1 + (joined p's of centre row 1) See figs. 4 (view from above) & 4a (view from side) 1 - 1

*Ch: 2 B 2

R: 1 + (3rd p of last R) 1 + (centre row 1) 1 - 1

Repeat from * 6 times joining last R to first R

Ch: 2 B 2





Joins are made to these p's

Row 3 – outer upright row. See fig. 3 for joins

NB make join go under BOTH sides of the p as before, but from centre to outer edge

Thread 8 beads on chain thread.

R: 3 – 3 + (joined p's of rings on centre row 1 see fig. 5 - view from side) 3 – 3

*Ch: 4 B 4

R: 3 + (3rd p of last R) 3 + (centre row 1) 3 – 3

Repeat from * 6 times joining last R to first R

Ch: 4 B 4




Fig. 6

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

Row 4 – Add 24 beads to chain thread and join three rings in between each row 1 join on BR. See fig. 6

R1: 1 – 1 + (brass ring) 1 – 1

*Ch: 2 B 2

R2: 1 + (p on last R) 1 + (brass ring) 1 – 1

Repeat from * 21 times

Ch: 2 B 2

R: 1 + (p on last R) 1 + (brass ring) 1 + (p on 1st R) 1

Ch: as last
