## **Button Brooches - © Jane Eborall**



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**Materials** 

No. 20 thread. 40 beads for each button. 1.5 cm two hole button.

## **Abbreviations**


- or p picot + join B move bead on chain thread to lie next to last double


+B add bead to picot before T & C tie and cut joining


## Joining the second round to the button through the picot.

This join is made like a regular picot join apart from taking the hook through the  $2^{nd}$  p of ring of round 1 and then **DOWN** through the hole in the button. Pull a loop up and over the button, back through the p of round 1 and pass the shuttle through (see figs. 1 & 1a – picot **not** shown in fig. 1).

Partially close the loop moving the p of round 1 slightly away from the edge of the button to leave a small space between the edge of the button and the p of round 1. Take the hook back down through the loop between the edge of the button and the p of round 1 and bring another loop up from the back (see fig. 2 & fig. 2a). Pass the shuttle through this locking loop. This will lock the ring to the outside of the button.










\*R6:  $3 + B (3^{rd})^{n}$  p of last R)  $3 + (join as before but use <math>2^{nd}$  hole of button)





Add beads to these tails according to taste. Use a needle threaded with sewing thread and tied into a loop with a knot. Loop this round the 'tail' and add beads to the needle. Slide the beads down onto the sewing thread and then onto the 'tail' See fig. 6

NB The button's shape can be refreshed if needed by soaking it in water, pulling into shape and leaving to dry naturally.



For an alternative look try this when working round 2 (see second picture at top of page). Place 8 beads on chain thread before starting and then work rings 1 & 2 as before
