1 B on Sh1


Tie shuttle threads together close to the ends using an overhand knot. Leave space of approximately ½" before starting R - this will form part of the tail.

R1: 1 vsp 1 vsp 2 vsp 1 vsp 1 Cl RW

Leave space of approximately 3%" before starting Ch - this will form the other part of the tail.


1 vsp 2 Lj (vsp R) 2 Lj (next vsp R) 4 Lj (next vsp R) 2 Lj (next vsp R) 1 CJ (round tail threads) 2 Lj (over tail threads) 2 Lj (vsp Ch) 4 RW

B @ back of hand before starting SR

SR2: 2 / 3 MB 2 Cl Tie a knot towards the end of each feeler and cut!




